American History for multi-grade elementary levels

Timeline of US history

Make with white cardstock. Draw a black thick line through the middle long ways. As you add dates to your time line, mark with dots or brackets to the information you are adding. After your child reads a book or you learn something interesting about that time, make a small picture or write out in words what you have learned. Glue it to your cardstock sheet by the line.

In each section, I tried to have a child friendly movie available to watch. I then chose a couple of read aloud books to show what that time period was like that I will read with the children. I chose reader books for my children to do on their own. I didn't do all chapter books for the older children because they will be doing a lot of reading this year and I felt that they could use some "shorter" books to get the lesson idea across.

After we read our books, we will make a picture of words of what we learned and stick it on our timeline. By the end of the year, we will have a long wall of information---pictures to come

We are going to break it up into pages, doing one page per month. There are 8 pages, that gives us 8 months of school to complete it. I am sure we will do it before, but this gives us extra time for holidays and mishaps \odot

Native American

People lived in the United States long before the arrival of Christopher Columbus and the Europeans. These people and cultures are called Native Americans.

The first people to live in a land are called indigenous peoples. This means they were the original settlers. The Native Americans are the indigenous peoples and cultures of the United States.

Sometimes these peoples are referred to as Indians or American Indians. This is because when Columbus had first landed in America, he thought he had sailed all the way to to the country of India. He called the locals Indians and the name stuck for some time.

Native Americans lived throughout North and South America. In the United States there were Native Americans in Alaska, Hawaii, and the mainland of the United States. Different tribes and cultures lived in different areas. In the middle of the country lived the Plains Indians, including tribes such as the Comanche and Arapaho. In the Southeast area of the country lived tribes such as the Cherokee and the Seminole.

The Native Americans were grouped into tribes or nations usually based on the area they lived in and their culture such as their religion, customs, and language. Sometimes smaller tribes were part of a bigger tribe or nation. As best as historians can tell, these tribes were fairly peaceful prior to the arrival of Columbus and the Europeans. There were hundreds of tribes throughout the United States when Columbus first arrived. Many of them are well known such as the Cherokee, Apache, and the Navajo.

The Native Americans did not write down or record their history, so we have to find out about their history in other ways. Today archeologists are able to learn a lot about past cultures by digging up artifacts such as tools and weapons. Much of what we know comes from the recordings of the first Europeans to arrive. We can also learn from traditions and stories that have been passed down within the tribes from generation to generation.

Today, some of the descendants of the original American Indians live on reservations. These are areas of land set aside specifically for Native Americans. This helps to protect their heritage and culture. However, only around 30% live on reservations. The rest live outside the reservations just like anyone else.

The Orphan Trains

In New York City in the 1850s, tens of thousands of children were homeless and even more lived in slums in destitute conditions. Orphanages were overflowing and city officials were looking for solutions. An organization called the Children's Aid Society stepped forward with an idea -- send the children out west to be adopted by willing and "morally upright farm families" who would be gladly looking for 'another pair of hands' to help with farm chores and child rearing. The plan was accepted and launched in 1853.

For the next 50 years, more than 120,000 children were loaded onto trains and send out west to different states (45 in total + Canada and Mexico!), stopping at train stops for residents to look them over and decide if they were appropriate for "placement." Some placements ended happily, with children warmly accepted and adopted into their new families. Some, however, resulted in very poor conditions, including abuse and near indentured servitude. Their compelling stories provide a window into the historical, social and culture mores of the era.
